- Timing: EPA hopes to issue the Request for Applications (RFA) in July

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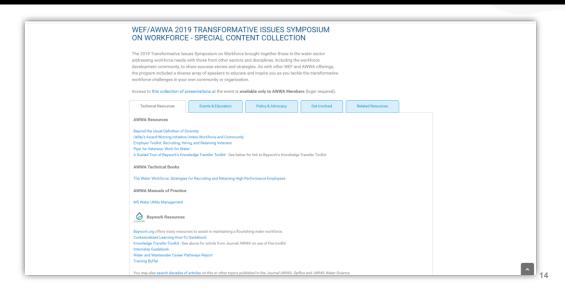
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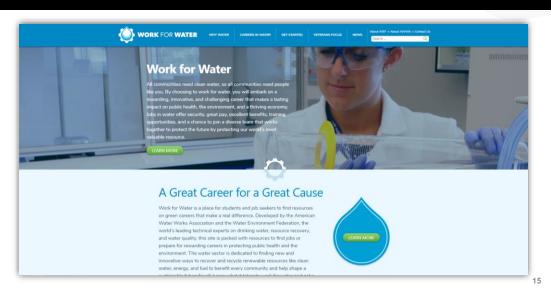
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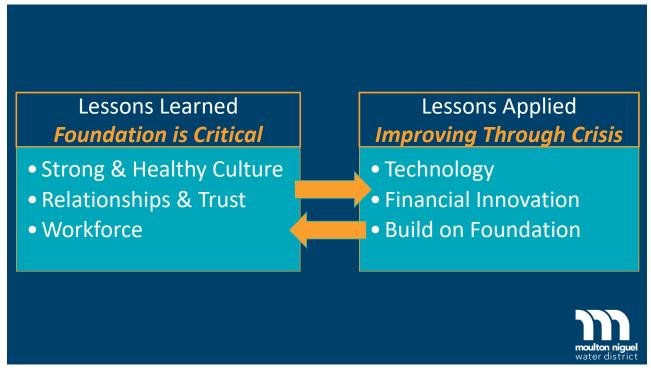

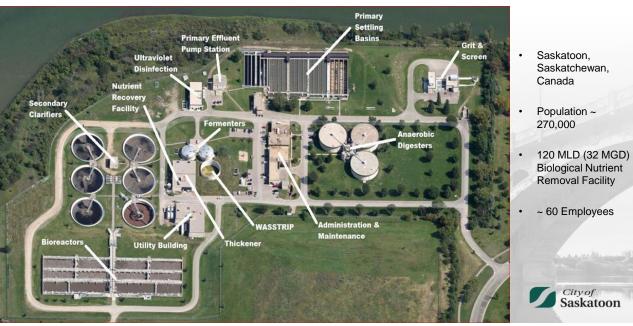


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City of Saskatoon Wastewater Treatment Plant
